Livingstone is Zambia's tourism capital and one of the most prized destinations on earth because it hosts the Mosi-oa-Tunya (Victoria) Falls, the world's largest curtain of falling water, a UNESCO World Heritage site, listed as one of the 7 natural wonders of the world. The Mosi-oa-Tunya by itself attracts more than 120,000 visitors annually, making Livingstone a destination of choice for tourism and enterprise.

I grew up in this amazing city with potential for economic activity and locally driven enterprise however, after spending fifteen years in the hospitality industry, I noticed with increasing concern that while Livingstone and surrounding areas draws the world to our doorstep, just beyond the luxury lodges that line the Zambezi, the unforgettable encounters with nature on the game drives and the breathtaking sunset cruises, local communities carry the weight of some of the world's most pressing challenges- youth unemployment, human elephant conflict, lack of ecological knowledge, limited access to education and clean water.

This is the seed from which Responsible Earth Keepers Foundation (REK) was born—I wanted to build a movement rooted in care, love, and sustainability in the heart of Livingstone, Zambia, to ensure local communities, especially those living along the elephant corridor, are at the centre of conservation efforts.

We have come a long way since our first glass cutter to upcycle bottles into finished wine glasses was donated by Munga Eco-lodge. Just this past year, we reached over 5,000 beneficiaries across our various projects focusing on conservation, education, water and sanitation and social inclusion for extremely vulnerable persons and communities.

Since moving to Maloni area in 2021, we have also had the privilege to mentor young men battling drug, alcohol, and other addictions through our counselling unit and REK Football club, young men whose communities had written them off as 'Junkies'.

We have witnessed amazing changes in the lives of the young people who have joined the club and consequently our counselling sessions, some even requesting to return to school after they had dropped out, and others becoming enterprising members of society.

These stories of hope have inspired many conservation enthusiasts across Zambia and Zimbabwe; proving that good news travels far and fast, and in this case, we reached more than 3 million people in the two countries.

We are cognisant of the fact that our work directly addresses the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) that the world has committed to attain by 2030. We are resolute in ensuring our community is not left behind in contributing to their attainment.

None of this amazing work would have been possible without our partners — CATS Conservation and Tourism Society, Maramba River Lodge, Jollyboys Backpackers and Camp and others— alongside our donors, our volunteers and our extraordinary team. Our foundation is strong because of you.

We have come a long way in spreading hope, love and the conversation on conservation, but we are honest about what we still need to get to where we envision. We want to establish a skills training centre and acquire the means to reach unreached communities, especially those living along the fragile elephant corridor.

All in all, we are grateful for the growing circle of people across the world who have chosen to stand with us to accomplish the impossible. Thank you for believing in our vision for a better, more sustainable Livingstone, a better Zambia and a better world.

The Responsible Earth Keepers (REK) Foundation is a Zambian non-profit (est. 2017, formalised 2025) operating at the intersection of community development, sustainability, and conservation education. Based in Livingstone—home to Mosi-oa-Tunya Falls and one of the world's most unique ecological footprints—we run eight programs across seven marginalised communities to alleviate poverty and raise conservation awareness.

Communities In Conflict

A Persisting Problem

Livingstone sits at the edge of one of Africa's most critical elephant corridors — an ancient migratory pathway stretching across Zambia, Zimbabwe and Botswana that elephants have travelled for centuries.

Today, that corridor runs directly through some of Livingstone's most vulnerable communities where families live, farm and raise their children in the same space as some of the world's largest land animals — leading to unavoidable conflict. A single elephant raid can destroy an entire household's annual harvest overnight.

Poaching, retaliatory killing and habitat loss have reduced Africa's elephant population from an estimated 10 million a century ago to fewer than 415,000 today — and the cycle of poverty and conflict along the corridor is accelerating that decline.

- Zambia loses an estimated 20–30 people per year to human-elephant conflict, with Southern Province among the most affected regions.
- With Youth unemployment above 50%, chronic school dropout rates among boys, a near-total absence of mental health support and communities still waiting for clean water — the case for conservation becomes weak. **And Elephants are Paying the Price.**

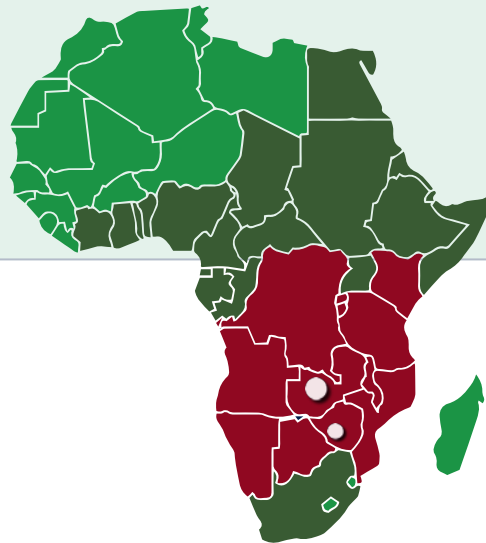

Generosity Wins

With Love: From the UK to Zambia — The Story of Simon and Audrey's Support for Community Transformation Through REK Foundation

For Simon Greene and Audrey Furnell, the journey into the heart of the Maloni community was a "personal connection formed while on holiday." They weren't looking for a project; they were looking for the soul of Zambia.

When they met Songiso Mukena, REK Foundation founder, they grew fond of his kindness and passion to lead his community. "His drive was impossible to ignore", recalls Simon, and it sparked a friendship that now carries a sweet aroma of hope for many.

When Songiso shared the story of a local kindergarten, a sanctuary for children that had been reduced to ashes, Simon and Audrey were instantly moved to action, helping REK achieve in days what could have taken months or years.

Within about a week, Audrey and Simon donated resources for the classroom to be rebuilt. "This is where it all begun", recalls Simon. "It proved that in a community like Maloni, a modest donation could achieve an immediate, tangible result."

Simon and Audrey have shown us that generosity isn't driven by a corporate mandate, but by a "deep belief in the human spirit". A belief in the fundamental good in people.



It is this belief that led to their generous support, which later helped supply a safe water source for a village in the Kazungula district. Through auctions and the support of friends in the UK, Simon and Audrey backed the drilling of a borehole that changed the village's daily life. Today, that well serves over 350 people, providing the dignity of clean water to a community that had been forgotten for over 50 years

Similarly, it was Audrey's contribution that reached into the dreams of the youth in Maloni. Seeing the boys of REK Football Club playing with "real talent" but lacking the basic gear to feel like a team, she provided resources to fully kit the club.

The impact that REK Foundation has made so far would not have been possible without the dedicated support of Simon and Audrey, whose generosity will be remembered for a long time to come.

“Tondo”: A Testimonial

Meet Vincent Kamitondo, popularly known as “Tondo”, a testimony of the impact of the REK mentorship program.

Vincent grew up in a child-headed household, carrying a weight no teenager should bear. With no adults to absorb the pressure, he found what many boys in his situation find — substances that made the heaviness survivable. Vincent came to REK Foundation spaces several years ago when he was only 14 years old.

We made it clear then, like we make it clear now to many children in his situation, our door is always open, we will never turn away a boy child because of a label that society has placed on them.

Yvonne Siakwasiya, REK Foundation’s counsellor, sat with him through the long road to recovery. “Vincent had a lot of weight on his shoulders,” she recounts, “it wasn’t easy for him — until our interventions began. He has shown the most progress in our sessions. He is proof that when a boy feels safe and not judged, he finally finds the room to change.”

Coupled with the counselling sessions, Vincent joined REK Football Club, and this too gave him structure and belonging.

Vincent is now a part-timer on our team, where he receives a monthly stipend from the sales of upcycled glass products, generating a direct income for him. He is no longer just a beneficiary of our programs; he is one of us, he is family.

Vincent’s story is what REK’s model looks like when it works — a young man, once written off, now standing on his own terms, skilled to work with his own hands, and helping others find their way to recovery.

Today, Vincent is one of REK’s most skilled glass cutters and a trainer, passing on what he has learned to his community and peers who walk through our doors.

Trash To Treasure

A Peak Into The Glass Upcycling Process



Turning Trash to Treasure

REK Foundation intercepts thousands of glass bottles from Livingstone's tourism waste stream, upcycling them into hand-finished glassware and decor. Our team uses a precise thermal-shock and hand-sanding method to transform discarded liquor bottles into high-value products. This technical discipline provides an avenue for skills transfer to communities in need.

Upskilling Communities

We move beyond basic training by providing both the craft and the tools required for economic agency. This year, REK upskilled 30 participants in the Libuyu community, including both youth and women, to understand the environmental and commercial significance of glassmaking. To help these new artisans earn independently, REK donated a professional glass cutter to the group, reinforcing our belief that skills need the right resources.

Growth & Partnerships

REK is built on a self-sustaining circular economy, with finished products sold directly to local lodges and hospitality partners. Monthly sales cover workshop overheads and provide vital stipends for volunteers, fostering job creation and social well-being. This revenue model reduces reliance on external aid, directly funding our mission to protect the elephant corridor while restoring the lives of the "boy child".

Pitch Full of Hopes

The Birth of Bold Dreams

In a region where young men and boys often face a near-total absence of mental health support and school dropout rates are chronic, REK Foundation Football Club (REK FC) was established as an intervention in 2025 to offer a **safe space** for mental health support; a space where bold dreams are nurtured.

The club serves as a strategic pillar of our holistic development model, using the discipline of the sport to foster social cohesion and team unity.

Beyond the game, the pitch acts as an entry point for psychosocial support, providing a non-judgmental environment where players can find hope and beat the stigma associated with vulnerability and drug abuse.

Through the football club, REK integrates recreational activities with mentorship, building a network of young men who understand the value of environmental conservation, sustainability and mental health.

Our gratitude goes to Divine Mercy Church for availing their football pitch for use by REK Foundation and to Audrey Flunnel for sponsoring the purchase of football kits for the REK FC team.

The pitch has now become a sanctuary to many youth, a space where the cycle of hopelessness is interrupted by the seeds of hope and restoration.

The discipline the boys display on the pitch is one we know they carry into their daily lives. We have witnessed them transforming into individuals who care about their lives, their families, the environment and their community.

On Christmas Day of 2025, REK FC played a professional side for the first time, and the commitment was electric. Our vision for the REK FC is bold, and it is our mission to ensure our boys are one day drafted into the national soccer team.

Water Is Life

Ending A 5 Decade Water Crisis

Nearly 6 million people in Zambia lack access to safe water, while over 9 million remain without basic sanitation ([UNICEF](#)). This also means only about half of rural households in the country have access to water.

In the Southern Province, these statistics translate into a daily struggle for survival. Rural areas and peri-urban settlements orbiting Livingstone in particular suffer from a clean water penetration gap that stalls economic development and fuels waterborne disease, which claim thousands of lives annually. To discuss conservation and sustainability, we must first address the underlying issues affecting communities in distress and that is what we are doing.

Through the dedicated mobilisation of our supporters, Audrey and Simon, who rallied their network to raise the necessary resources, REK has transformed the daily reality for 350 residents of Ngweze Sikambwe (Simuyuni village) in Kazungula District. This community had lacked a reliable source of fresh water since its establishment in the 1970s.

Our intervention now provides a consistent flow of clean water, eliminating the threat of illness and the labour of covering kilometres just to access water.

REK will continue to replicate this intervention to reach rural communities in Southern province's rich natural habitat, especially those communities living along the elephant corridor.

By prioritizing these overlooked regions, REK Foundation and its partners are ensuring that rural communities are included in the conversation on conservation- leading the journey toward a resilient and healthy future.

Through this project REK is aligning with Global Goals and directly championing [SDG 6](#) (Clean Water and Sanitation) and supplementing government efforts in closing this gap in line with Zambia's [Eighth National Development Plan \(8NDP\)](#), [which targets universal water access by 2030](#).

Focus on Education

REK's Education Initiatives



REK partnered with **Educate a Child Rural Zambia** to fund and build a new classroom block, currently under construction. When complete, it will provide a dedicated learning space for 120 pupils who previously had none.

Additionally, our conservation education programme has reached 1,100 school children across Livingstone's districts this year — taking environmental awareness directly into classrooms and planting the seeds of stewardship in the minds of the next generation.

REK also currently supports three students in formal education — one at the tertiary level and two in secondary school.

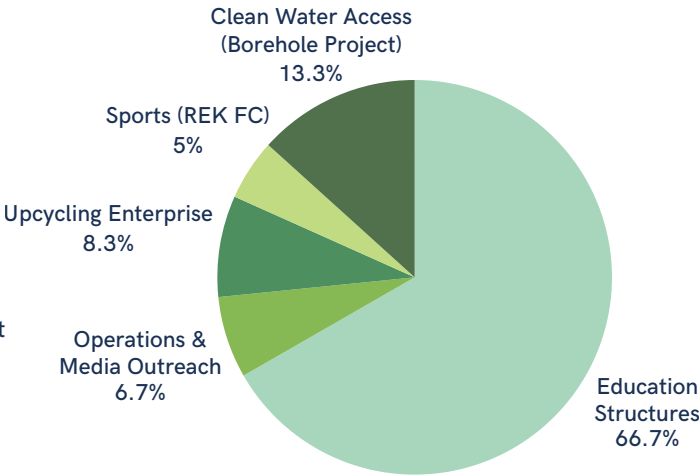

REK's glass upcycling enterprise now generates K500 per month — K6,000 annually — (~ USD 26 per month — ~ USD 310 annually) from the sale of recycled glassware through lodge partnerships, a modest but meaningful proof of concept that with expansion, REK holds the potential to self-sustain its operations.

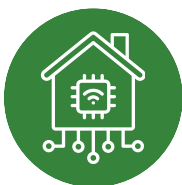
Community Centered Ambitions

We are honest about where we are and honest about where we need to go. We are seeking partnerships with institutions and individuals who are passionate about climate action and environmental sustainability. The following outlines a step-by-step vision for the REK Foundation, building on the strong support systems we have built over the years, and we invite you to join us on this mission



01 — Governance and Accountability

Currently led by a small, dedicated part-time team, REK is working to formalize its governance structure and establish systems for oversight. As our reach grows, our accountability will grow with us to return the trust of our donors and the communities we serve.



02 — A Permanent Home — The REK Eco-Hub

Today, our glass upcycling workshops, counselling sessions, and skills training take place outdoors and in borrowed spaces. We want to build a permanent Eco-Hub — a dedicated centre in the Maloni area where young people can learn a trade, access psychosocial support and find community under one roof, with the capacity to serve over 150 youth at a time.



03 — Mobility to Go Where the Need Is

Our borehole projects, food relief deliveries and conservation education programmes are currently limited by the absence of dedicated means of transportation. Securing a vehicle would allow us to reach the remote communities that need us most — and to scale our Trash to Treasure enterprise by collecting waste materials from further afield, growing the income that funds everything else we do.

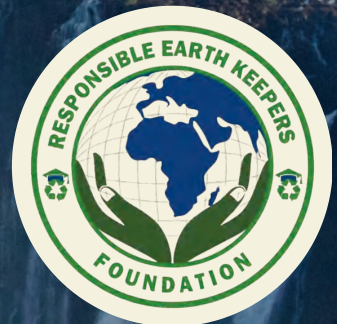
